### Abstract Submission Instructions

*Information you will need to complete the online submission forms is included in these instructions. You are reminded to have this document to hand while making your online submission.*

#### General Information:

Deadline for receipt of symposium submissions (including symposium overview and individual symposium abstracts) is 15 September 2014.

Deadline for receipt of individual paper and poster abstract submissions is 22 October 2014.

You may return to the submission system to complete or edit your work at any time before the deadline date.

Please use **Arial font** in size **10** pitch for all text copied from word processed documents. Text should be single spaced.

Titles are limited to a total of **20 words**. The title should be as brief as possible but long enough to indicate clearly the nature of the study. Capitalise the first letter of each word. No full stop at the end.

Titles must be in title case format:

**Correct** - Advance Directives: Research Results

**Incorrect** - Advance directives: research results

Symposium overview text and all abstract texts (excluding titles) are each limited to **250 words**.

Please note that because of web browser limitations some scientific symbols from copied text may not paste correctly into the form. Please check them. You may have to correct them by writing the name of the symbol in full, for example "beta" instead of  $\beta$ .

When using abbreviations, please spell out full name on first use.

If you are making more than one submission, you can use the same email address and password for each submission. Please use an email address that you check frequently and include a current telephone number. These will be used for correspondence regarding your abstract(s).

The first time you visit the submission system, you will be required to register your details. Thereafter, you may log into the system using your email address and password.

## Submission Process – Symposium Overview and Individual Symposium Abstracts

1. Click on the submission system link on the event website. Enter your email address and the password you chose when you registered with the system.
2. When you click the “**log in**” button you will be taken to a screen from which the submission process starts. Chose the option ‘**Click here to make a new individual paper or poster submission or to submit an abstract to a symposium (if you are a convenor/chair)**’
3. Follow the on-screen instructions. Please pay special attention to ‘required’ fields.
4. When submitting the abstracts to your symposium, please refer to the abstract submission instructions below.

## Submission Instructions – Abstracts

- You may find it useful to prepare your abstract in advance on a word processing system so that you can copy and paste your text. Your abstract text should be fewer than 250 words (excluding title of 20 words maximum, and authors’ details). No tables, boxes, columns or diagrams are allowed. No indented or hanging paragraphs please. You are allowed a maximum of two references. Please ensure that all authors are credited and that their names are spelled correctly. Each abstract should be divided into four brief and clear paragraphs:
  - **Background:** Clearly state the purpose of the abstract and include a brief background statement.
  - **Methods:** Describe the methods used, for example study design, study population, statistical test(s), (no boxes, tables or diagrams).
  - **Results:** Summarise the results of the study and include key statistical data.
  - **Conclusions:** Outline the main implications of the study. Emphasize any new and important aspects of the study and conclusions that are drawn from them.

*Please use the exact headings outlined above (i.e. do not use Introduction, Methodology, Findings, Discussion etc.)*

- A “blind” selection process will be used. No identifying features such as names of universities, colleges, hospitals, medical schools, clinics or cities may be listed in the title or text of the abstract. Do not include the names of authors in the title or text of the abstract. The names of authors and their affiliations (institutions) will be submitted separately on-line when you submit the abstract.

- To be accepted for presentation, abstracts of presentations that seek to frame theoretical questions or advance understanding of the application of the arts, social sciences and humanities, should summarise major conclusions.
- Abstracts based on empirical research projects must report actual results, not promised results.
- Where there are co-authors, please nominate a backup author who may present your abstract in the event of the nominated presenter becoming unavailable.
- Presenters of accepted abstracts must register to attend the Meeting.
- All successful abstracts will be printed in the Meeting Programme and Book of Abstracts. This may be an Open Access publication. They will also be included in the Irish Gerontological Society's Database of Abstracts in Gerontology.

### **Submission Process – Individual Paper and Poster Abstracts**

1. Click on the submission system link on the event website. Enter your email address and the password you chose when you registered with the system.
2. When you click the “**log in**” button you will be taken to a screen from which the submission process starts. Chose the option ‘**Click here to make a new individual paper or poster submission or to submit an abstract to a symposium (if you are a convenor/chair)**’. Follow the on-screen instructions.
3. Submitting an abstract is a 4-step process. Each step asks several questions. Please pay special attention to ‘required’ fields.
4. **Note:** At step 3 you will be asked to manually enter a topic code for your submission. For your convenience, the list of topic codes is included at the end of this document.
5. Step 4: once you have completed this step click the “Finish” button. If you have answered all the mandatory questions then your abstract will be assigned a reference number and you will receive email confirmation. The final screen will include a summary of your submission **which you may print**. Use the **Back** key at the bottom of this screen to make changes to the current submission. Use the **Next** key if you wish to submit another individual or poster abstract or to submit another abstract to a symposium (if you are a convenor/chair). This will bring you back to the start of the submission process. If you have not answered all the mandatory questions your abstract will be held in temporary storage until you return later and complete all the questions.
6. You may log in later to edit your submission – up to the deadline date.

### **To Edit a Submission Before the Deadline Date**

You may wish to complete or change your answers to some of the questions in your submission.

1. Log in to the submission system via the event website, as before.

2. You will see a list of your previous submissions. Click on submission that you wish to change.
3. The process of amending a submission is the same as the original submission process, except that the submission form will be automatically filled in with the answers that you gave previously.
4. When you reach the final step and press “Finish” you will be sent an email confirming that your submission has been amended – provided you have answered all the mandatory questions.
